According to a 2000 study by the Institute for Women's Policy Research, women in Alabama lag behind in every index measured: political participation, employment and earnings, economic opportunity, reproductive rights, and health and well-being. This report assigns Alabama a grade of D- and of the 50 states, we rank at the bottom even in evaluating the status of women in their communities (The Status of Women in Leadership in Alabama, 2003).

But *Ready to Run* is prepared to provide non-partisan training that will position women leaders for the challenge of changing the quality-of-life standards for all Alabama citizens – men, women and children. This is truly a dynamic opportunity for AAUW of Alabama to increase the participation of women leaders in government in the 21st century and We Can Do It Together!

Now is the time to "be renewed" in our vision for Alabama! *Ready to Run* is ready to go because now is NOT the time to do "business as usual!" Are you ready? Ready to Run: Training Alabama Women for Government Leadership

The concept for *Ready to Run* is an outcome of AAUW of Alabama's Program Theme Team and Public Policy Committee. In the process of developing statewide programs to support the national theme, "Education as the Gateway to Women's Economic Security," discussions revolved around the problems in Alabama. After much research, it was determined the problems affecting Alabama women and their issues are centered on the fundamentally flawed Alabama Constitution and the insufficient number of women participating in governmental processes. Therefore, the Program Theme Team and Public Policy Committee concluded that the voice of women in Alabama had to be stronger.

Recruiting participants and/or becoming a *Ready to Run* participant is vital to Alabama's progress because we need more women serving in government leadership. Our goal is to train qualified Alabama women. Therefore, qualified women in AAUW and women in our communities cannot afford to miss this opportunity, because Alabama is paying a high price for the absence of women's voices in our state's leadership.

Ready to Run Needs You!

The time is fast approaching for the branches of AAUW of Alabama to present *Ready to Run* to its members and women in the community, and We Need You! What do we need? We need all branch members to get excited about *Ready to Run* by attending and inviting women in the community to their branch programs, which will promote the training. What do we need? ACCR Luncheon Commemorated Life of Bailey Thomson

A diverse crowd of 400 Alabamians gathered in Birmingham in August to take part in the first annual Bailey Thomson Awards Luncheon. This event commemorated the life of Bailey Thomson, founder of the Alabama Citizens for Constitutional Reform (ACCR) Foundation, and honored some of the people and institutions that have continued the effort to write a better Alabama Constitution.

Cynthia Tucker, Pulitzer Prize winning journalist, provided an eloquent keynote address for the event saying it is imperative we "carry on this important work." Ms. Tucker, who was born in Monroeville and graduated from Auburn University, is the Editorial Page Editor of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution.

The late Bailey Thomson established the ACCR Foundation in 2000 as part of a grassroots movement for civic renewal and constitutional revision. Among his many literary accomplishments, Thomson and two colleagues wrote an editorial series about Alabama's fundamentally flawed constitution titled, "Sin of the Fathers." The series was a finalist for a Pulitzer Prize in 1995.

Governor Albert Brewer, an ACCR Foundation Board Member, presented the Bailey Thomson Award to Dr. Thomas E. Corts for his early leadership and continued support of the ACCR Foundation. Sandra Behel presented the Constitutional Reform Citizen Educator of the Year Award to Lewis Lehe for his initiative in creating the *It's a Thick Book* video. Ann Florie, 2005-2007 ACCR Foundation Board Vice-Chair, gave the Constitutional Reform Partner of the Year Award to Greater Birmingham Ministries for its education campaign involving people of faith and low-income communities on the issues of constitution reform.

Mark Berte, Grassroots Education Director for the ACCR Foundation and AAUW of Alabama ACCR Liaison, said "there is much to celebrate in the Constitution Reform Movement which is growing every year thanks to the solid foundation built by so many people like Bailey Thomson and Dr. Corts. The citizen convention legislation went further this year than it ever has before and It's a Thick Book, our new innovative and engaging documentary, has been a tremendous success in bringing new people to the cause."



Regional Director's Message

Congratulations to Alabama for presenting workshops on the Alabama Student Advisory Council and Student Affiliate Satellites at the AAUW National Convention! You are the most progressive state in the Southeast Central Region. I am constantly touting the SAC. Alabama members should be proud of their state's leaders, their diversity and their accomplishments. I am also pleased to see Alabama leaders participating in national committees and boards.

Thanks to all members who participated in the Strategic Planning. The response to the surveys was greater than expected. Your input was invaluable in the process toward the restructuring of AAUW at the national level. The end result was an unprecedented unanimous vote in Phoenix, in favor of uniting the Association and Educational Foundation. But what does this all really mean? For this next year these boards will operate as separate entities, and in the year 2008-9, the two boards will meet jointly to merge into one functioning board, which will be elected in 2009. The Association and Educational Foundation will combine many of their assets and activities to form a streamlined, mission-driven organization with a single set of elected officers. Most of your AAUW dues will then become part of the 501(c)3 non-taxable, charitable entity (now known as the AAUW Educational Foundation), but a portion of your dues will be directed to a 501(c)4 category designated for Public Policy initiatives such as Voter Education, lobbying efforts, etc. To ensure this transition occurs smoothly, the two current boards have created seven committees and/or task forces (details at www. aauw.org/member center/leader corner/ strategic pp2006.cfm).

Another key change approved by the delegates provides for voting between con-

ventions by mail or electronic balloting. This "one member, one vote" amendment gives all members a voice in the organization's decisions and will make AAUW a more responsive and equitable organization. Delegates also adopted amendments setting maximum terms for elected officers, outlining procedures for filling vacancies that arise among regional directors and committee chairs, establishing an audit committee, and restructuring the nominating committee.

The Association board has eliminated the Conference of State Leaders in favor of nationwide leadership conferences for ALL leaders, potential leaders and members. This conference will be held on the same day in multiple locations across all of the states. Puerto Rico and Guam with locations to be determined.

I would like to stress the need for branches to support the Association's call for branches to utilize mission-based programming for their members. Theme teams have been set up in all states and act as liaisons for ideas (other ideas at www. aauw.org/newvision/Mission-BasedProgramResources.cfm). These efforts answer the requests from the membership for a return to AAUW's Mission .

As a dues-driven organization, membership is vitally important. Take advantage of Shape The Future Membership discounts: new members recruited at meetings advertised as open to the public will pay $\frac{1}{2}$ the national dues - a savings of \$23.50!

Members often ask: "What do I get for my dues money?" Is it AAUW's Outlook magazine? Is it Washington Update? Is it EdEqChange? Or is it behind the scenes? Check out the AAUW website for a wealth of information and resources. You will learn the return on dues is greater than the investment.

Legislature in Action

One warm weekday morning in May, my friend Carrie and I drove to Montgomery to observe the Alabama State Legislature in action. We were guests of Representative Laura Hall (D-Huntsville). I had met Representative Hall twice previously, one of those occasions being the 2007 AAUW of Alabama State Convention.

Our day started off watching Representative Hall's aide rushing around, gathering papers for a morning meeting. Following the meeting, we were offered breakfast before the House of Representatives convened.

Shortly, a series of tones sounded, summoning the Representatives to the day's session. Carrie and I were amazed by the bustling activity of the House. Professionally dressed men and women milled about and greeted one another; others read the newspaper or perused the day's agenda. Carrie and I were not the only guests; several middle-school aged children acted as pages, running errands for the representatives.

Representative Hall introduced us to several of her colleagues, all of whom were delighted to have us observing the inner-workings of the State government. We met Representative Patricia Todd (D-Birmingham), who spoke passionately about one of the bills presented later in the day. She supported House Bill 247 being debated, which would have added sexual orientation to Alabama's hate crime laws. Unfortunately, the majority of the House members did not vote in favor for a debate. During the lunch break, we were able to meet members of the Black Caucus, a board on which Representative Hall acts as chairwoman.
